Cut and colour the title bar and add that to the front of the book or paste it directly into your project book.

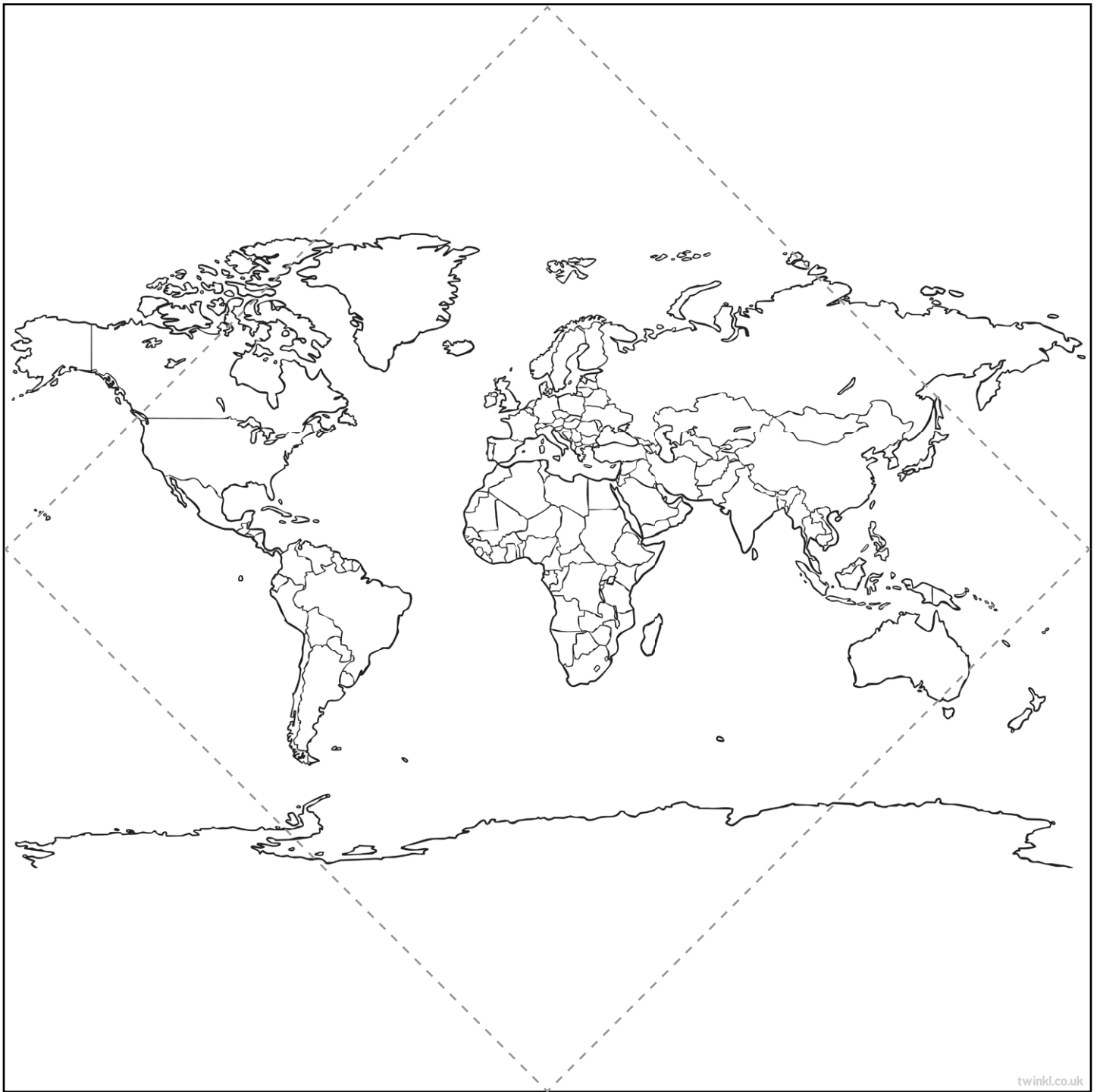
